PRESS CREDENTIALS





QUOTING ERK RUSSELL

DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE - "Defensive guard, experience wise, is probably our best position on defense. Theoriea Ward, Jessie Jenkins and Eddie Johns have played there for two years. Defensive tackle and defensive end are experienced positions but we are only one deep there.

"Theoriea Ward may be our best defensive player. He has the best strength of the group there. Jessie Jenkins is small and quick and has a lot of experience. Eddie Johns is also a capable player. This position gives us our best people in terms of depth.

"At defensive end, John Richardson is experienced but with no depth behind him. We have the same situation at defensive tackle. Jeff Evans is a quality ballplayer, but again we have no experienced depth behind him. Richardson and Evans should be really good players for us."

LINEBACKERS AND SECONDARY - "The inside linebackers are not quite as experienced but they are good athletes. Rodney Renfroe and Charles Carper were both moved to linebacker in the middle of last season and still have some learning to do.

"Hugo Rossignol had two or three really good games last year at rover. He is experienced at the position and right now knows the position as well as he ever has.

"Danny Durham at strong linebacker should help us.

"The secondary is wide open. Last year I felt the secondary was our most troublesome spot. Nay Young and Kevin Hutchinson were regulars there last year. However, neither has established themselves at this point as regulars again.

"Overall, I feel that we are pretty good defensively with our front line people, but there is no proven backup help. That's not to say that our backups can't play. It just means that we lack experience in our substitutes."

OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS · "When you talk about our offense, you have to start with our quarterback, Tracy Ham. I don't know how he compares with other quarterbacks in Division 1-AA, but I can say that he is the finest quarterback in the state of Georgia.

"In handling our offense, the option is very important as is the sprint out

pass. I feel that he is the best at doing those things.

"However, because of the number of times he carries the ball, he is subject to injury. He missed two full games and parts of two others last year, but that is a chance that has to be taken with our offense.

"Right now, I would have to say Brant West is our backup at

quarterback."

RUNNINGBACKS - "Our best position in terms of depth is our running back spot. At tailback, we have the Harrises, Gerald and Ricky, Melvin Bell and Steve Anderson if he recovers from a leg injury. All those guys are capable performers.

"The plan right now is to play Gerald Harris and Ricky Harris at fullback some too, along with Clint Harper who came on strong late last season."

OFFENSIVE LINE AND RECEIVERS - "On the offensive line, we have quality players in tackle Vance Pike and Mike Mears. Right now, it looks like we'll move Mears to center although he played tight end last year. He is an outstanding blocker. We won't rule him out at tight end completely though, because he does some things well there.

"Fred Stokes is potentially a very fine lineman for us, but he has been

hampered by injuries since coming here.

"Scott LaSalle started for us last season, but is recovering from knee surgery and is a doubtful performer.

"Larry West is steady at guard.

"We return three performers at receiver. Robert Baker, Monty Sharpe and Delano Little all played there last year. Size is a problem because most of these guys are small and in our offensive scheme we require our wideouts to do a lot of blocking."

SCHEDULE

"It seems like every year, we're starting a new program. The first year, we had to build a program. The second year we fielded our first team against a partial schedule. Last year we played our first full schedule against all four year schools. This year we're moving into Division 1-AA and the quality of our opponents has increased.

"We have a lack of depth at most positions. We're not two deep everywhere. There is a big drop-off in some cases between starters and

backups and that could tell on us this season.

"Our goal is to beat Florida A & M and Middle Tennessee State and everybody in between. Any time you button the chin strap and kick it off you have a chance to win.

"Our coaching staff will have a game plan for every game. If executed properly, that game plan will give us a chance to win. Realistically, it will be a hard year for us. Some of the teams we play are great teams. In some of our games, on paper, there is no conceivable way we can win the game. But we'll show up anyway."



OFFENSE

Quoting Ben Griffith Offensive Coordinator

"We have felt since we've been here that our offensive backs are our strongest position. Of course that depends on how you look at it. We have a lot of depth. At tailback, we have Melvin Bell, Gerald Harris, Ricky Harris.

Steve Anderson and Ken Hicks. Melvin, Gerald and Ricky had good year for us last year and we feel that Anderson can be a good back if he can stay healthy. Hicks walked on this spring and does not possess great speed, but is a hard, smart runner.

"That's the good side. The other side is that they are all still sophomores. That means they're young and they have a lot to learn.

At fullback, Clint Harper came through for us last year. Plus, we are planning to play most of the tailbacks at fullback some this season.

"I don't think there is any question that Tracy Ham is the finest quarterback in the state. He proved last year that he can win. The key to Tracy is if he can stay healthy. Brant West and Tank Stephens will back him up and we feel that our depth is better at quarterback this year than ever before.

"On the offensive line, Vance Pike is a talented player. He is a good leader is the sense that he leads by example. Mike Mears is a quality player. However, Mike is moving to center this season from tight end and how well he adjusts will determine what kind of year he has. Mears has an opportunity to be an outstanding player. If he has a future in football, we think it is at center.

"At wide receiver, we have some quality athletes. The receivers are good route runners with good hands and good option blockers. Our only problem is a lack of size. We're small, but I can't complain because they have done the job for us.

"Overall, our backs are our strongest position. Our biggest weakness is probably a lack of senior leadership. We only have two seniors on offense — Jeff Lee and Buddy Beauchamp. Well, Mears is a senior, but he is having to adjust to a new position. I think a lot of our success this season will be determined by what kind of leadership we get out of our older players."



DEFENSE

Quoting Mike Healey Defensive Coordinator

DOWN LINEMEN

"We felt real good about our down linemen last year. We don't have a great deal of depth, but the players that we do have are as good as anybody we'll play — Jeff Evans, Theoriea Ward, Eddie Johns, John Richardson and Jessie Jenkins.

"Greg Williams and Mark DeFoor both had excellent springs and we are looking for them to help us in the fall. Sammy Williams has good physical dimensions. He missed last year because of knee surgery and we hope he can return to top form. He has good ability and good range.

"We need to improve our depth at these positions. Hopefully we can get some help from signees and walk-ons. Our success will depend somewhat on our frontline players staying health."

LINEBACKERS

"Linebacker was a major concern for us last season. We do not have great size, but the players we have are good and consistent. Danny Durham and Hugo Rossignol are sturdy players with good experience. We expect Ben Holt to help us. He had a good spring. Jack Gerdon was a walk-on who had a good spring and should see some playing time.

The inside linebackers are stronger now than they were last fall. Rodney Renfroe has great athletic ability and Robert Underwood is maturing as a linebacker. He is recovering from knee surgery and had to miss spring practice, but he had a good fall last year. Beau Brown was a part-time starter for us last season and is a good hitter and team leader.

"Charles Carper has fair speed and average size but he has a superior talent for getting to the ball. He is good at avoiding blockers and finding the football. Mark Wesley had an excellent spring. He does not possess great speed but is a good hitter with good ball awareness."

SECONDARY

"The secondary was a problem area in 1983. We've had so many personnel changes since we started the program that we have no established players.

"Nay Young and Kevin Hutchinson both started for us last season and are back this year. They are frontrunners for starting jobs this fall.

"We are looking for a cornerback. Ric Perry and Nate Hayes were parttime players for us last season and are back this year. Brad Bowen has played some at safety and gives us some depth there."

OVERALL

"In order for us to do well, three things need to happen. Our down linemen need to stay healthy, the linebackers must continue to improve and the secondary needs to become stable."

But Newberry tackled punter Brit Barker in the end zone for a safety with just over two minutes left, and then scored on a short pass with just over a minute remaining to snatch victory from the Eagles.

Terry Woodard had been described all his life as a happy person.

He loved People.

Those who knew him said: "You could always count on Terry. He'd lead the group, encouraging everyone to do his best.

Out of the sands of Dade City, Fla., Terry came to Georgia Southern College in Statesboro. He wanted to play football.

During practice he'd run — not trot — to the next drill, urging his squad on.

His coach said of Terry: "One of his finest assets was taking what the good Lord had given him and moving it to its maximum. He got the most out of his talents."

His teammates responded to his type of leadership.

As a sophomore he had not yet earned a starting position, but he was there on the sidelines cheering, helmet in hand, ready to go when his coach said, "Move, Terry."

Over the past 23 years I've watched college students walk in front of my office windows on their

way to class. I've seen their lives unfold and develop.

Unfortunately, we hear too much about their parties.

We don't hear enough about their achievements or the quiet way they go about making them happen. Meet me any night in a college library and I'll show you the quiet side, the achievement, the dedication.

Terry.

Into his second year of studies, he was taking his walk across campus.

That is, until two Sundays ago when an afternoon ride in the south Georgia countryside inter-

rupted it all. An accident. Suddenly, Terry, his strengths, his smile, his dreams, vanished. I sat with his friends and faculty in a memorial service last Monday afternoon as they remembered him. They packed the place — standing room only. Hundreds came from classes, dorms, snack bars to the 3 p.m. service.

His classmates spoke of him; a coach fighting tears did the same. A prayer was offered, scripture read, and testimonies were given by players stunned with emotion and disbelief that their friend, jersey number 92, was gone.

He had done so much for them.

The service ended as a friend sang "Memories."

The words filled everyone there: "Memories . . . light the corners of our minds . . . memories of the way we were.

These young people were dealing with death. It was tough. It was an unfair interruption to their game plan. To them, now is not a time to die.

Yet, within their prayers and tears that afternoon, I saw strength.

A strength they really didn't know they had until Terry Woodard, defensive tackle, their friend, became a memory

After the service they walked in to a murky, warm afternoon with spring chasing away the last vestiges of winter.

Soon, they were back in the dorms, the library, the classroom. Their individual walks had been taken up . . . again.

For those who knew and loved Terry, for those who attended his memorial service, life is now just a little more precious

It has become a sonnet to be lived more fully each day.



Dr. Dale W. Lick

President Georgia Southern College

As president of Georgia Southern College in Statesboro, Dr. Dale W. Lick is a long way from his native Michigan, but considers the South Georgia countryside close to home and his rural beginnings.

Raised on a farm in Marlette, Michigan, Lick's interests turned to math and science in college. He earned his bachelor's and masters degrees in mathematics from Michigan State University with minors in engineering and

biology and doctoral degree (Ph.D.) in mathematics at the University of

California at Riverside.

Lick was tapped for the presidency of Georgia's largest senior college in 1978 while he was dean of the School of Sciences and Health Professions

at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Va.

His career in teaching and administration has taken him to every region of the nation, with faculty positions at Port Huron Junior College, the University of Redlands, the University of Tennessee, Drexel University and Russell Sage College. He has held consulting and post-doctoral positions at Oak Ridge and Brookhaven National Laboratories and a management

post at Michigan Bell Telephone.

A member of many honorary and professional associations, Georgia Southern's president is a notable in such listings as Who's Who in America, American Men and Women of Science, and Leaders in Education. The author of numerous articles on science and engineering, mathematics, interinstitutional cooperation, hunger and malnutrition, health and innovations in education, Dr. Lick also writes a weekly column carried by more than a dozen South Georgia newspapers and hosts weekly cable television and radio talk shows.

From the special perspective of his own rural heritage, Lick has emphasized Georgia Southern's role and responsibility as a resource in the development of rural health, education and leadership in Southeast Georgia. During his presidency he has stressed the concepts of service to the region and state and the worth and dignity of people, and has been at the forefront on state and national levels in bringing attention and action to rural problems, particularly in education and health. He is currently the Chairman of the Committee on Agriculture, Renewable Resources and Rural Development for the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and this year keynoted the national conference on rural education in Washington, D.C.

Lick married his childhood sweetheart from Marlette, the former Marilyn Foster, and the president's family now includes three teenage children.



Dr. David "Bucky" Wagner

Director of Athletics

Since Bucky Wagner was named Athletic Director at Georgia Southern College in 1981, the Athletic Department has been called "the most ambitious college program in the country" by the **Sporting News**. In his three-plus years at Southern, Wagner had added a football team, hired one of the most respected football coaches in the country in Erk Russell, begun a strong booster program, seen the basketball team go from 5-22 to an appearance in the NCAA Tournament, added an 18,000 seat football stadium and enlarged and reorganized the athletic department staff.

One of the most popular athletic directors in the Southeast, Wagner's initial job was to rekindle a football program that had been dormat for 41 years. His interest in building a strong total program at Georgia Southern can be seen in the many improvements across the board in the Southern

program.

Wagner came to Southern from Vanderbilt where he had served as Assistant Athletic Director and was specifically charged with the Business and Ticket Office operations and with the Fiscal Affairs of the Department. Among his first steps at Southern has been to put the Eagle program on a sound fiscal basis and to install a strong business management area to aid the coaches in budget control.

Also at Vandy, Wagner was vy instrumental in the enlarging and refurbishing of the Commodores football stadium, a project which was com-

pleted in fall, 1981.

Prior to taking the position at Vanderbilt in 1978, Wagner spent several years at Florida State University, serving in both the Athletic Department and the administrative sector of the institution. His duties for the Athletic Department included assistant football coach and academic advisor to all athletes. He received his doctorate in 1972 and accepted a position in the Division of Community College Affairs. By 1975 he had been elevated to Director of Student Matriculation Affairs with responsibility for supervising the offices of Articulation Affairs, Admissions and Orientation, through which he planned, coordinated and implemented the University's programs for prospective students.

In 1977 Wagner was named Acting Dean of Student Services at FSU with direct supervision over nine major university offices providing academic


support services to students.

A native of Ohio, Wagner attended Sandy Valley High School in Magnolia. He lettered in football, basketball and track. He completed his undergraduate work at Ohio University where he quarterbacked the Bobcats' football team to the 1960 NCAA College Division National Championship. He remained at Ohio as an instructor of Health, Physical Education and Recreation and coached the Bobcats' freshman football and baseball team from 1961 to 1966. For the next three years he served as an assistant football coach with the varsity. The 1967-69 OU squads were Mid-American Conference Champions.

His professional associations include memberships in the National Association of College Directors of Athletics, College Association of Business Managers of Athletics, and the American Association of Health,

Physical Education and Recreation.

Wagner's wife Nancy is an Assistant Professor in the Accounting Department at Georgia Southern.



ERK RUSSELL

Head Football Coach

After 17 seasons as Defensive Coordinator at the University of Georgia, Erk Russell accepted the head coaching job at Georgia Southern on May 23, 1981. But his job responsibilities included more than just coaching. He was charged with rebuilding a football program that had lain dormant for 41 years.

In his first two years at the helm of the Eagles, Russell has proved that he is the man who can bring football success to Southeast Georgia. The Eagles are 13-8-1 in

their first two years on the gridiron.

Russell's accomplishments in his first season at Georgia Southern were tremendous. The 1982 team was made up entirely of walk-ons. The squad listed one senior and no juniors. The remainder of that unit were sophomores and freshmen. The Eagles had practiced together little and had never played together, but under Russell's direction, the team faced and defeated established NCAA and NAIA teams.

Last season Russell continued the quickly established winning tradition at Georgia Southern with a 6-5 mark. Four of the five losses were by five points or less.

Russell's value to Statesboro, Georgia Southern College and Southeast Georgia is not only felt on the football field. Russell has instilled a sense of pride in the area. He has given the people a symbol, a team to call their own. His homespun manner and superb coaching that has made him a legend in the coaching profession has easily transferred to Statesboro. He is one of the people, one of the boys, but his success on the football field has raised him head and shoulders above the crowd.

Russell's defenses at Georgia were always among the nation's leaders. In 1967, the Bulldogs were the SEC leaders in total defense and scoring defense. In 1968, the Dogs again led the SEC in total defense, and led the nation in scoring defense, giving up only 9.8 points per game. In 1969 Georgia ranked sixth nationally in scoring defense. In 1971 Russell's troops led the nation in shutouts, ranked sixth in rushing defense, ninth in total defense and eighth in scoring defense. In 1978, Russell's squad finished second in the nation to national champion Alabama in scoring defense by a single point. in 1979 Russell's defense led the nation in 'takeovers' with 49.

In his first campaign with the Eagles, the Russell tutored defense allowed 17.3 points per game. On the ground, the defense limited the opponents to 98 years per game and only one rushing touchdown. His specialty teams held the opposition to six net yards in punt returns.

Last season his offense averaged 23.9 points per game and 371.1 yards per game in total offense. Georgia Southern led their opponents in almost every offensive and

defensive category.

A native of Birmingham, Ala., Russell earned ten varsity letters during his collegiate career at Auburn in football, basketball, tennis and baseball. He earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Auburn.

He returned to Auburn in 1958 to coach freshman football and baseball and became a varsity assistant coach in 1961. In 1963 he was named head defensive coach at Vanderbilt and one year later joined Vince Dooley at Georgia.

In his first collegiate coaching assignment, offensive back coach Paul Cates joined the Georgia Southern football staff two years ago.

Prior to joining GSC, Cates served one year at Bulloch Academy where he tutored the offensive and defensive backs at the varsity and junior varsity level. Under his guidance, the team finished in the runner-up slot in the SEAIS State Championship.

Cates attended college at Georgia Southern where he earned his B.A. in Health and Physical Education. He is currently in graduate school working on his master's degree.

Cates attended high school at Bradwell Institute where he lettered in football and baseball.

PAT DOUGLAS, Defensive Backs

Entering his second season on the Georgia Southern coaching staff, former Eagle defender Pat Douglas adds playing experience to the Southern defensive back corps.

The lone senior to graduate from the 1982 GSC football squad, Douglas performed one year in the Blue and White leading the secondary in total tackles and interceptions. In 11 games, Douglas accounted for 45 total stops and nabbed six interceptions. Prior to joining GSC, he was at Georgia for three seasons and appeared with the national championship team in New Orleans.

Douglas went to the Bulldogs from Aquinas High

School in Augusta where he starred in football at safety and quarterback. He received his bachelor's degree from Southern in 1983 and is currently working on a master's in Health and Physical Education.



BEN GRIFFITH,Offensive Coordinator

A former coach at Hart County and Elbert County High Schools in Georgia, Griffith serves in a full-time capacity as offensive assistant.

The Copperhill, Tennessee native works with the quarterbacks and heads the offensive staff meetings.

He came to the Eagles from Elbert County. Before that he was at Hart County for two years. He started his high school coaching career at Wheeler County in Marietta where he was offensive coordinator from 1973-76 and served as an assistant coach on the North All-Star team in 1975.

Griffith, 37, was a quarterback at Tennessee Tech where he received his BS degree in 1972 and an MA in 1973. He served as a graduate assistant at Tech while working on his masters. As an undergraduate he was a guard on the Eagles' basketball squad.

He was an all-star quarterback and basketball guard at Copperhill. Ben and his wife Sharon have two sons.



MIKE HEALEY, Defensive Coordinator

Healey coordinates the defensive staff for Eagle head coach Erk Russell. His field assignment is working with the linebackers.

A native of Jacksonville, Florida, he attended Bishop Kenny High School and returned there to coach after earning his degree from the University of Florida. He was an assistant at Kenny from 1971-75 when he was named head coach. He earned "Coach of the Year" honors his first two seasons.

At Florida, he was a starting defensive tackle in 1967 and 1968. He received his BA degree in 1970 and an MA in 1973.

Healey, 37, starred in football and track at Bishop Kenny.

PAUL JOHNSON, Defensive Line

In his second season on the Georgia Southern staff, Paul Johnson is the defensive line coach.

Defense is a new assignment to the talented Johnson who came to Southern from Lees-McRae Junior College where he served as offensive coordinator. Under his guidance, the team finished the 1982 season seventh in the nation in total defense. At the prep level, Johnson was offensive coordinator from 1979-80 at Avery County High School in Newland, NC. His two year record at the school was 19-2.

Johnson received his B.S. in 1979 at Western Carolina and later received his M.S. at Appalachian State in 1981. The Newland, NC native is married to wife Susan.

Johnson was a three sport letterman at Avery County High School.





HUGH NALL, Offensive Line


A member of the 1980 Georgia National Championship team, Nall brings his expertise to the offensive line of the Eagles.

Nall played his collegiate ball for the Bulldogs from 1977-80, earning a starting spot his junior and senior seasons. In his stint with Georgia, he played in the Blue Bonnett Bowl, and the 1980 Sugar Bowl that decided the National Championship. Following graduation, he remained on the Athens campus and had full responsibility of the Bulldog centers.




Among his duties with the Athletic Department are game management, ticket management and overseeing the operation of the business office.

ALLEN E. PAULSON STADIUM

On April 9,1980, Georgia Southern president Dr. Dale Lick announced that the school would rekindle its football program after 41 years of dormancy. On May 23, Erk Russell was hired as the head coach giving the program immediate credibility and national attention.

Coach Russell said that he had a dream — a dream of the finest football facility in the nation for a 1-AA school. He called it "Southeast Georgia's dream." On September 1, 1984, it will no longer be a dream. As the billboards read, "Southeast Georgia's dream is no illusion."

At a cost of over four million dollars, Allen E. Paulson stadium is being constructed near the Southern campus. In its initial phase, the stadium will seat 18,000 fans with the capability to expand to a maximum of 50,000 seats in the future.

Special features of the stadium include a natural turf field that will accomodate both football and soccer, special private VIP boxes that will be climate controlled with luxurious interiors, private restrooms, food service areas and other features, a facilities building in the open end of the natural bowl to be used for team and officials dressing rooms. The second level of this facility will be a Southern Boosters hospitality room with a patio overlooking the field and 5,200 parking spaces on the stadium site.

Paulson Stadium will reflect and enhance the growing importance of Georgia Southern College, the community and Southeast Georgia — an importance reflected by the area's economic and educational impace on the stante, nation and world.

The stadium is named for Allen E. Paulson. Background on Mr. Pauson is on the next page.



ALLEN E. PAULSON Gulfstream American Corporation

An aviation industry entrepreneur, Allen E. Paulson, 61, is today the Chairman of the Board, President and Chief Executive Officer of the world's largest privately owned aircraft manufacturing company Gulfstream American Corporation.

Founder of major modification centers: California Airmotive Corporation in 1951 and American Jet Industries. 1970. In 1978 Paulson acquired Grumman American Aviation Corporation in Savannah, Georgia, from Grumman Corporation and in 1981 acquired Rockwell International's jetprop business aircraft manufacturing division located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. In Gulfstream American Corporation Paulson manages an aircraft manufacturing organization encompassing 1.7 million square feet of manufacturing facilities and the talents of over 3,500 employees. Sales for 1983 are projected to

reach \$500 million.

Born in Clinton, Iowa, Paulson attended the Iowa State Teachers College and continued his education in electrical engineering at the University of West Virginia. He served in the U. S. Army Air Corps from 1943 to 1945. Following his Army discharge, Paulson was employed as a Flight Engineer for Trans World Airlines earning initially 30¢ per hour. During this period, recognizing the growing need for engine parts by the airline companies, Paulson founded California Airmotive Corporation and purchased new-surplus engines for parts, Paulson became one of the major airline suppliers for new and reconditioned aircraft engine parts in the United States. California Airmotive also specialized in converting airline passenger aircraft to cargo configurations. A new company, American Jet Industries, was founded by Paulson in 1970 to concentrate on converting general aviation piston-powered aircraft to propjet configurations to develop special purpose aircraft.

A commercial and instrument rated jet pilot who has flown a variety of experimental aircraft, Paulson's aeronautical designs for in-line, combination power aircraft

resulted in his being granted five patents.

As President of American Jet—a company with \$35 million average annual sales-Paulson, in 1978, acquired Grumman American Aviation Corporation. Reorganized as the Gulfstream American Corporation, Gulfstream American currently produces the world's largest twin engine corporate jet, the Gulfstream III. The Savannah facility also produces the 37 passenger Gulfstream I-C modified, propjetpowered commuter aircraft and provides major modification services for corporate owners and operators of earlier-model Gulfstream aircraft, including the Gulfstream

In February 1981, Paulson's Gulfstream American Corporation acquired the Commander Jetprop business aircraft manufacturing facilities in Oklahoma from the Rockwell International Corporation. Operating as the Commander Division of Gulfstream American Corporation, the division currently produces three models of twin engine, propjet powered aircraft. The Commanders are marketed through a worldwide network of franchised Regional and District Sales Centers. New jetprop models are being developed for addition, on an annual basis, to the Commander Division's line of business aircraft.

In April 1982, Paulson's firm was rated as the world's largest privately owned aircraft manufacturing company. The same month, Gulfstream American Corporation

received its first listing on the New York Stock Exchange.

Paulson's aviation industry-related activities include his active membership in the Society of Experimental Test Pilots and the U. S. Air Force Association. Elected to the Board of Directors of the General Aviation Manufacturers Association, Paulson currently serves as Chairman of the Association's Airport/Airways Committee.

Paulson is a member of the Board of the Trust Company Bank of Georgia, the Savannah Symphony Society, the Society of Automotive Engineers and the National Aeronautic Association. He holds memberships in the Savannah Chatham Club in Savannah, Georgia, the Sea Pines Plantation, Hilton Head Island, South Carolina and the Quail Creek Country Club in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.



M.C. Anderson

Born and raised in Bulloch County, M.C. Anderson is the Father of the Georgia Southern football stadium. Demonstrating his drive and willingness to strive for his beliefs, Anderson was the first individual to step foward and say that he was ready to see Georgia Southern's dream become a reality.

The founder and owner of one of the largest construction firms in the south, Anderson's rags to riches story began in 1962. That year Anderson purchased his first bulldozer and cleared land on the weekends. The following two years saw Anderson pur-

chase a second bulldozer and dedicate his total energies to the construction business. The M.C. Anderson Construction Company formally opened it's doors in 1964.

Specializing in site preparation, the company demonstrated expertise in utility construction, storm drainage and all pre-construction preparations.

Under Anderson's guidance, the company's most ambitious venture to date is the simultaneous site preparation of four projects with an estimated value of 20 million dollars. Anderson's advice and dedication is responsible for the present construction of Georgia Southern's football stadium.

Glenn E. Bryant

Glenn Bryant is currently serving in the 1982-1983 term of the General Assembly of Georgia, representing the Third Senatorial District. This is his third term in office.

Bryant is the Past-President of Coastal Utilities of Hinesville, an independent telephone company, and currently serves as the Chairman of the Board.

The Pensacola native has devoted a major portion of his adult life in public service, and service to the local and area communities.

Bryant was appointed Mayor Pro-Tem of the City of Hinesville from 1960-1962. He then served as the Mayor of Hinesville for the following eight years.

In 1971 Bryant was elected to the Board of the Liberty County Commissioners and served as the Chairman of this board for eight years.



During his administration as Mayor and as Chairman of the Liberty County Board of Commissioners, Bryant played a major role in the planning, development and/or construction phases of a new regional jail, a new city hall, new high school, and a new county hospital.



Morris Lupton

Beginning with only one store in Brooklet in 1967, Morris Lupton has stretched his Time Saver Convenience store into a chain of 20 located from Hinesville to Lyons to Statesboro.

Growing up in Jacksonville, Lupton developed a love for sports while playing prep football, basketball, and baseball. He also played baseball at the semi-pro level.

Long and hard hours of toil did not stop Lupton from his community activities. He was the first President of the Southern Boosters giving the new organization immediate status, credibility, and a guiding hand to seek counsel.

Lupton has also served on the City Council in Brooklet for two terms and is an active member in the Statesboro Rotary.

SOUTHERN BOOSTERS

Southern Boosters, Inc. is the backbone of Georgia Southern Athletics. Funds raised by Southern Boosters are used for athletic scholarships and recruiting.

Membership in Southern Boosters has grown to 1300 members in its short three year existence. While the bulk of the members reside in the Statesboro area, Southern Boosters has large and active chapters in Augusta, Atlanta, Macon, and numerous cities throughout the State. Under third-year Executive Director Ken Winstead, Southern Boosters has developed one of the most successful Courtesy Car programs in Division I-AA. In addition to money raised for scholarships and recruiting, over \$4 million has been raised through Southern Boosters for the construction of Paulson Stadium.

Priority seating and parking for football and basketball are determined by an individual's annual donation to Southern Boosters. Donation levels run from the basic "Booster" (\$50 minimum) to "Gold Eagle" status (\$5,000 and above). Booster members enjoy many privileges, such as priority seating, special parking for home games, periodic newsletters, pre-and post-game socials, weekly luncheons with the

coaching staff, and use of the new Facilities Building at the stadium.

Ken Winstead is in his third year as head of Southern Boosters. Ken received his undergraduate degree in Public Relations from Ohio University in 1980 and his Master of Sports Administration from Ohio University in 1981. Winstead, 26, is responsible for all Booster activities. He is heavily involved in fund raising and promotion of Southern Boosters. The Springfield, Ohio native is single and resides in Statesboro.

Wanda is beginning her third year with Southern Boosters. She is a 1964 graduate of Georgia Southern with a B.S. degree in Education. She obtained her Master's degree in Education from Southern in 1975.

Parrish oversees the office organization and development as well as handling all financial matters for Southern Boosters. The Metter, Georgia native is married to Dan Parrish, Jr. The couple resides near Metter.
