ONTACTING COACH RUSSELL

If your call is of the urgent nature and Coach ussell is not available, contact the Sports Information Office at (912) 681-5239 or 5187.

LAYER INTERVIEWS

We encourage you to interview our football players at Georgia Southern. However, e do request that you contact the Sports Information Office a day in advance of our arrival in Statesboro. Please do not expect players to be available if you have not lade prior arrangements. Players' phone numbers will not be given out, but the Sports information Office will try to make sure players return your phone calls. On-Campus incrviews should be conducted after practice and all interviews should be concluded by hursday afternoon. Players are not available for interviews on Friday for any reason. layers' rooms are considered private living areas and are off-limits to everyone except thletic department staff.

NTERVIEWING TRACY HAM

Because of the great demands in past seasons for interviews with Tracy Ham, we lust limit the number he does every week. During the season, Tracy will be available or both phone and in-person interviews on Mondays both before and after practice and n Thursdays before practice. We hope this will not cause any problems for you. If you re unable to interview him at the specified times, we will make every effort to arrange mutually satisfactory time, but it cannot be guaranteed.

QUOTING COACH RUSSELLON THE OPPONENTS

FLORIDA

"Our opener with the University of Florida requires no comment, except HELP'. Fortunately, we have an open week following the game in which to heal. Hopefully, that will be long enough."

FLORIDA A&M

"Florida A&M has a new staff which means 'new life' to a team with acknowledged ability. We held on to edge them last year."

MIDDLE TENNESSEE STATE

"Middle Tennessee is a perennial power in the Ohio Valley Conference. They will be just as good, if not better in '86. They beat us 35-10 during the regular season last year. We beat them in the playoff game and I know they will be foaming at the mouth in anticipation of revenge when we travel to Murfreesboro."

UT-CHATTANOOGA

"UT-Chattanooga is always strong and will be a contender, as usual, to win the Southern Conference. This will be our first home game and I hope we will still be alive when they come to town."

EAST CAROLINA

"East Carolina is on a plateau above us and playing at their place will not enhance our opportunity to win. We played them in '84 and we played pretty well, but not quite good enough to win. The Pirates are followed by 'Open Date' and we have never lost one to them."

IAMES MADISON

"James Madison is one of the stronger independents in Division I-AA. I hought last year they were as good as any team we played. They beat us rather soundly and they will be better in '86."

TENNESSEE TECH

"New staff. Will be better."

BETHUNE-COOKMAN

"They dress out like the Washington Redskins and are just as big. We will be hard pressed to continue to outscore them."

WESTERN KENTUCKY

"They throw it 50-60 times a game, and Bowling Green is a long way on the Eagle Express. This will be a 'two box lunch' trip."

CENTRAL FLORIDA

"We always have a difficult time with them. The score board lights have been severely tested in the past. In my opinion, this team has potentially the brightest future in the country."

SOUTH CAROLINA STATE

"Physically, they are as good as any opponent we play. Their quarterback, like ours, is particularly effective. He outruns our defense."

What To Do For An Encore?

After an outstanding season last year, head bach Erk Russell, has heard this question all inter, spring and summer. Georgia Southern ulled off what many thought to be the impossile last season. After just two seasons of I-AA ompetition, and four years of football, the agles won the National Championship last recember in Tacoma, Washington.

The fact is Georgia Southern's football team eached the top, so what does head coach Erk ussell do now for an encore? Possibly beat lorida or go to the I-AA playoffs again?

The Eagles do have a strong nucleus back ff of last year's team with 19 lettermen returning (includes specialists). But the schedule is augher and five defensive letterwinners are hissing.

"This is the toughest schedule we have had ere," Erk Russell commented about the '86 late. "Swapping Newberry and Troy State for lorida and East Carolina can be extremely azardous to an Eagle's health. Our opening ame with Florida requires no comment, except HELP'. Fortunately, we have an open week ollowing the game in which to heal. Hopefully nat will be long enough."

The schedule this season has Georgia touthern playing seven away games. Georgia touthern faces Tennessee-Chattanooga, James Madison, Bethune-Cookman and South Carolina state at home.

The strength of the 1986 team will come rom the skill positions on offense. Tracy Ham eturns to run the offense, and as many saw in he playoffs, he can do it all. Ham completed i5 percent of his passes last year for 1,405 yards. It ran for another 751 yards and scored nine ouchdowns. Backing up Ham is sophomore ignal caller Ernest Thompson. Thompson saw imited action a year ago. Ken Burnette will also



supply adequate support at quarterback.

The running backs are seniors Ricky Harris and Gerald Harris. R. Harris led the team in rushing from his tailback positon last year. He will play A-Back in this year's offensive scheme. He gained 825 yards a year ago. G. Harris gained 494 yards at fullback, and nearly doubled that total in the 1985 Playoffs. He scored 10 touchdowns and averaged 4.3 yards a carry. Garry Miller should add depth at fullback while Steve McCray and Keith Geter will see plenty of playing time behind R. Harris.

Frank Johnson, known for 'the catch' against Furman, will play the other A-Back position. Johnson rushed for 199 yards on 21 carries in limited duty last year. Herman Barron will backup Johnson and should see plenty of playing time. Barron caught 18 passes for 341 yards a year ago.

The wide receiver positions have possibly the most depth of any position on this year's team. Monty Sharpe, Tony Belser, Delano Little, Darren Chandler and Ross Worsham will all see a great deal of playing time. Sharpe holds just about every pass receiving record at Southern. Belser, Chandler and Worsham are three young and up-and-coming receivers. Little is an experienced leader along with Sharpe.

Up the middle, the Eagles offensive line

returns two experienced centers, and both starters at left and right guard. Dennis Franklin and Jay Marshall are battling for this starting center position. At the guards, Georgia Southern has Charles Cochran and James Carter returning. Ronald Warnock and Sean Gainey should provide adequate depth. Mike Wagner and Brad Bernard could also see playing time at either guard position.

The area which concerns the Eagle coaching staff the most is offensive tackle.

"We lost our two starting tackles from '85 in Vance Pike and Jeff Evans," Russell commented. "They were the mainstays of our offensive line and we will be hard pressed to be as effective at those positions, especially early in the season."



One apparent replacement is Fred Stokes. He has the potential and is an excellent performer at left tackle. The other tackle will be Tony Smith or George Jones. Jones is a redshirt freshman while Smith backed up All-America selection Vance Pike in 1985.

Defensively, Georgia Southern must replace defensive guard Jessie Jenkins (117 tackles), second-team AP All-America linebacker Charles Carper (102 tackles), defensive tackle John Richardson (70 tackles), defensive guard Eddie Johns (55 tackles) and rover Hugo Rossignol (49 tackles). All five were starters and provided strong leadership last season.

"We have had to fight and scratch for survival on defense, and it looks like we will have to continue in that vein in spite of our experience in the secondary," Russell said about the '86 defensive unit.

The experienced secondary includes corner-backs Chris Aiken and Nay Young. Aiken finished with 70 tackles and five interceptions a year ago, while Young totaled 65 tackles and two interceptions. Adequate depth at the corners will be provided by Terry Young (Nay's younger brother) and Bruce Holbrook.

Brad Bowen and Milton Gore are battling for the safety position. Both are seniors and split starting time last year. Bowen finished with 48 stops and one interception, while Gore tallied 53 tackles and three interceptions.

The linebacking corps should be the strong point of the '86 defense. Flint Matthews returns after a strong sophomore year that saw him pick up 63 tackles. Wesley Lee, a senior, and junior Robert Underwood are battling for one middle linebacker position. Underwood finished with 36 tackles in 1985, while Lee totaled 27 playing mainly on specialty teams. David Hodge has the outside linebacker position nailed down. Hodge finished last year with 13 tackles in a reserve role. Thomas Porter provides adequate depth on the outside.

Danny Durham switches from outside linebacker to the rover position this year. He totalled 42 tackles last season. Warnell Anthony and Everette Sharpe (Monty's younger brother) provide depth behind Durham.

Tyrone Hull has moved to defensive tackle from inside linebacker last year. Hull has gained weight and is stronger. He tallied 60 stops and had one interception last year. Doug Taylor, a transfer from Temple, and Kelly Dawson should add excellent depth at tackle.

Larry Boone and Charlie Waller appear to have the defensive guard positions nailed down. Boone finished with 53 stops a year ago. Waller is a redshirt freshman. Craig Walker and Donnie Allen should also see playing time. Walker finished with 17 tackles in a reserve role and Allen totaled 32 stops.

DUTLOOK

Edward Eaves returns after starting at fensive end at the end of the regular season 1985. He underwent knee surgery this winter ter a late season knee injury. Eaves will be icked up by Jeff Banks and Sammy Williams. oth Banks and Williams could see action at fensive tackle if needed.

The Georgia Southern kicking game should in great shape once again with All-America lection Tim Foley handling the field goal and tra point duties. Foley connected on 16 of 17 eld goals and 34 of 35 PATs in 1985. Trey erold will handle the kickoff chores and back sley up on placements. Herold consistently somed the ball into the end zone last season.

"The place kicking game should be a emendous plus for us this year with Tim oley) back," Russell mentioned. "His imbers (field goal and extra points) may have

been the best in America in '85. His performance could be a large factor in our success this year."

Rob Whitton and Pat Parker will battle for the punting chores. Whitton averaged 32.1 yards a punt and Parker 39.1 yards in 1985. The center for long snaps will be Stan Stipe. Monty Sharpe will be the holder.

"The general outlook for the '86 team is much the same as last year," Russell commented. "We take the same approach offensively and defensively. The personality of our team should be very similar to that of a year ago. A great asset of the '85 team was that they 'played together' very well. It will be most important for this year's team to develop that same characteristic."

If that characteristic is developed, Georgia Southern should not have to worry about what to do for an encore in 1986.



Five years ago, Georgia Southern hired k Russell to begin a football program that d laid dormant for 41 years. This past ason, Russell brought home the coveted tional championship. With the knowledge ined from 17 years as the defensive coornator at Georgia and a knack for otivating players, Russell built a firm base r Georgia Southern's championship team.

Over a four-year period, Russell has shioned a 34-13-1 record. The Eagles ade their first post-season appearance in e 1985 NCAA I-AA Playoffs and managle to win it all.

Russell's first team in 1982 consisted tirely of walk-ons. Only one senior and juniors appeared on the roster, but with e guidance of Russell, the team finished ith a 7-3-1 record.

The 1983 Eagles faced a schedule of CAA and NAIA established opponents. that second season, Russell led the team a 6-5 record. Four of those losses came five points or less.

His 1984 team moved into the NCAA I-AA ranks and finished with an 8-3 record and narrowly missed the playoffs. With a team composed of 65 percent freshman, Russell forged wins over established I-AA opponents Florida A&M and UT-Chattanooga.


Last year's team surpassed all of Russell's previous teams with a 13-2 record, a bid to the 1985 playoffs and a national championship. Georgia Southern again beat established I-AA opponents Florida A&M and UT-Chattanooga, along with Jackson State, Middle Tennessee, Northern Iowa and Furman enroute to the national championship. Southern also beat I-AA opponents East Tennessee State and South Carolina State. The Eagle football team gained national respect and Russell is the main ingredient in gaining the Eagles that respect.

Russell's value to Statesboro, Georgia Southern and the surrounding area can be felt on, as well as off the field. The com-

munity has developed a sense of pride with Russell giving people a symbol and a team to call their own. His warmness and superb coaching have made him a legend in the coaching profession and that has transferred into the Statesboro community. He is considered one of the boys, but his coaching ability and success have raised him above the crowd.

Russell's defenses at Georgia were always among the nation's leaders. His




1967 Bulldog defense was the SEC leader in total defense and scoring defense. In 1968 the Dogs again led the SEC in total defense, and led the nation in scoring defense. The 1969 Bulldog defense ranked sixth in the nation in rushing defense. The 1971 Georgia defense led the nation in shutouts, ranked sixth in rushing defense, inth in total defense and eighth in scoring defense. In 1978, Russell's squad finished second in the nation in scoring defense to national champion Alabama. His 1979 defense led the nation in "takeovers" with 19.

In his first campaign with Georgia Southern, Russell tutored the Eagle defense which allowed 17.3 points per game. On he ground, the defense limited opponents o 98 yards a game and only one rushing

touchdown. His specialty teams held the opposition to six net yards in punt returns.

The 1984 team was ranked nationally in yards per game and scoring, as well as rushing offense. Georgia Southern averaged over 422 yards per game and scored over 31 points per game while rushing for an average of over 350 yards per game.

The 1985 team gave up 19.5 points per game, while scoring 30.7 points per game. The Eagles rushed for 251.3 yards a con-



test and gave up 165.5 yards a game on the ground.

A native of Birmingham, Alabama, Russell earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Auburn. He earned ten letters during his collegiate career, lettering in football, basketball, tennis and baseball.

Russell's collegiate coaching career began at Auburn as the freshman football coach. He became an assistant on the varsity level in 1961, then moved to Vanderbilt where he coached the defense for one year. In 1963, Russell joined Vince Dooley's staff at Georgia.

Russell is married to the former Jean Farmer of Birmingham, Alabama. They have two sons who are also coaches.

DeLoach began his high school coaching career at Gainesville High School. During his one year stay, he helped Gainesville to a Northeast Georgia Championship.



Georgia Southern College Vice President for Academic Affairs Harry S. Carter will be the Acting President of the college during an expected year-long search for a successor to Dale W. Lick, who assumes the presidency of the University of Maine Sept. 1.

His upcoming role will not be new to the vice president, who acted as the college's chief executive in the president's absence.

Carter has been serving GSC since 1975 when he joined the business school faculty and has twice been cited among the top five percent of professors

in a campus-wide student survey. He held previous teaching positions at Virginia Commonwealth University and at the University of Georgia where he earned his doctorate in business.

Among his administrative appointments at Georgia Southern, Carter has headed the department of management and served as assistant to the business dean, was assistant to the president under Lick, and was acting vice president for academic affairs during the 16-month search from 1982-83.

As the college's chief academic officer, Carter governs an instruction and research budget in excess of \$20 million and the 400-member faculty of the 7,000-student campus. He was one of the primary architects of the college's major framework for planning, which has been cited as a model for higher education by the National Center for Higher Education Systems. During his tenure as vice president, five new degree programs have been added, and 10 programs earned initial or renewed accreditation.

In addition to his degrees from GSC and U.Ga., Carter holds a master's degree in management science from United States International University in San Diego and attended Emory University. In 1984 he was selected to attend the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard University on Scholarship from Shell Oil. Carter, part of a five-man Rotary Group Study Exchange to Scotland, was chosen to participate in Leadership Georgia, and was awarded a fellowship in academic administration from the American Council on Education.

Active in civic and community projects, Carter serves on the Bulloch County Board of Education, the Statesboro Recreation Department Board of Directors, the Georgia Recreation and Parks Society Board of Directors, comptroller of the 165th Georgia Air National Guard with the rank of major, and is in a number of leadership posts in the First United Methodist Church and the South Georgia Conference of the UMC. He is a past president of the Bulloch County United Way.

Carter and his wife Brenda have two children, Bill, 15, and Ashley, 11.

DR. DAVID "BUCKY" WAGNER DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Bucky Wagner became Georgia Southern's thletic Director in 1981. Since that time The porting News has named the Southern athletic proram as "the most ambitious college program in the ountry." Over the last five years he has made an npact on the program with the addition of football the program and hiring of one of the most respected ootball coaches in the country in Erk Russell. /agner also hired basketball coach Frank Kerns and w that program advance to the NCAA tournament nd become a prominent contender for the Trans america Athletic Conference crown. He established



ne Southern Boosters and raised money to build 18,000 seat Allen E. Paulson Stadium. Iis understanding of athletic administration led to a reorganization and enlargement of ne athletic department.

Wagner, one of the most popular athletic directors in the Southeast, had the initial ask of rekindling the football program after a 41-year absence from the collegiate gridiron. Ie shows a great deal of interest in the overall program at Georgia Southern as evidenced y his involvement as president of the New South Women's Conference.

Prior to his arrival on the Georgia Southern campus, Wagner served as Assistant Athletic Director at Vanderbilt. He was specifically in charge of the business and ticket ffice operations, and fiscal affairs of the department. His background in this area helped put the Eagles' athletic program on a sound fiscal base and has helped to build a strong usiness management area to aid coaches in budget control.

Wagner was also involved in the enlarging and refurbishing of the Commodores Footall Stadium at Vanderbilt.


Before Wagner's tenure at Vanderbilt, he spent several years at Florida State in both he athletic department and administrative sector of the University. In the athletic departnent, Wagner worked as an assistant football coach and academic advisor to all athletes. n 1972 he received his doctorate from Florida State and accepted a position in the Diviion of Community College Affairs. By 1975 he had been elevated to Director of Student Natriculation Affairs with the duty of supervising the offices of Articulation Affairs. On the first play of the fourth quarter, Northern Iowa added another three-pointer to take a 26-24 lead. But it was short-lived. Gerald Harris scored on a 13 yard run less than two minutes later to give the Eagles a 30-26 advantage. The Eagles made it 33-26 on a 29 yard Tim Foley field goal, but Northern Iowa tied the score five minutes later on a short run.

Leave it to Tracy Ham, though. With just 34 seconds remaining, Ham ran 20 yards for the score and the Eagles were on their way to a national championship showdown.

In the second half with the Eagle's option hutdown, Tracy Ham went to the air. Georgia outhern scored on touchdown passes of Ham to Jonty Sharpe, Ham to Frank Johnson, a 52-yard buchdown run by Gerald Harris and a Ham to Ierman Barron airial. Furman came back after outhern had taken a 35-28 lead to knot the score

at 35-35. Tim Foley then kicked a 39-yard field goal. Furman came back and scored with 1:32 left in the game to take a 42-38 lead. Then came the drive heard around Georgia and the nation for that matter. Ham hit Johnson with a 13-yard touchdown pass with: 10 seconds left on the clock and Georgia Southern held on to win the National Championship 44-42.

Ham finished the game with 419 yards passing and another 90 yards on the ground. Frank Johnson had 148 yards in pass receptions. The term "Just One More Time" had given the Eagles and their fans something to rally around, and helped to lead a two-year-old I-AA program to the top of the NCAA in that division.







ALLEN E. PAULSON STADIUM...



THE NATION'S FINEST 1-AA FACILITY

On September 19, 1984, Georgia Southern inaugurated Allen E. Paulson Stadium with a 48-11 whipping of Liberty Baptist. But it was more than just a game. It was yet another milestone in Georgia Southern's meteoric rise to the top of NCAA football.

Constructed at a cost of \$4.7 million, Allen E. Paulson Stadium is one of the finest, if not the finest, 1-AA facilities in the country. It is the culmination of four years of work and planning by a host of people.

On April 9, 1980, Georgia Southern president Dr. Dale Lick announced that the school would rekindle its football program after 41 years of dormancy. On May 23, Erk Russell was hired to build the program giving it immediate credibility and national attention.

Coach Russell had a dream—a dream of the finest football facility in the nation for a 1-AA school. He called it "Southeast Georgia's dream." Now that dream is no illusion.

The current stadium seats 18,000 people. There are two expansion phases built into the design of the stadium. The first will expand it to approximately 35,000 seats while the final phase will raise the capacity to 50,000.

Special features of the stadium include a natural turf field that will accommodate both football and soccer, special private VIP boxes that are climate controlled with luxurious interiors, private restrooms, food service areas and other features, a facilities building in the open end of the natural bowl to be used for team and officials dressing rooms. The second level of this facility is a Southern Boosters hospitality room with a patio overlooking the field and 5,200 parking spaces on the stadium site.

Paulson Stadium reflects and enhances the growing importance of Georgia Southern College, the community and Southeast Georgia—an importance reflected by the area's economic and educational impact on the state, nation and world.

The stadium is named after Allen E. Paulson, who donated more than \$1 million towards the construction of the facility.

ALLEN E. PAULSON GULFSTREAM AEROSPACE CORPORATION



An aviation industry entrepreneur, Allen E. Paulson, 63, is today the Chairman of the Board, President and Chief Executive Officer of the world's largest privately owned aircraft manufacturing company Gulfstream Aerospace Corporation.

Founder of major modification centers: California Airmotive Corporation in 1951 and American Jet Industries, 1970. In 1978 Paulson acquired Grumman American Aviation Corporation in Savannah, Georgia, from Grumman Corporation and in 1981 acquired Rockwell International's jetprop business aircraft manufacturing division located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. In Gulfstream Aerospace Corporation Paulson manages an aircraft manufacturing organization encompassing 1.7 million square feet of manufacturing facilities and the talents of over 3,500 employees. Sales for 1983 were more than \$500 million.

Born in Clinton, Iowa, Paulson attended the Iowa State Teacher's College and continued his education in ectrical engineering at the West Virginia University. He served in the U.S. Army Corps from 1943 to 1945. ollowing his Army discharge, Paulson was employed as a Flight Engineer for Trans World Airlines earning itially 30 cents per hour. During this period, recognizing the growing need for engine parts by the airline impanies, Paulson founded California Airmotive Corporation and purchased new-surplus engines for parts. The ulson became one of the major airline suppliers for new and reconditioned aircraft engine parts in the United ates. California Airmotive also specialized in converting airline passenger aircraft to cargo configurations. New company, American Jet Industries, was founded by Paulson in 1970 to concentrate on converting general riation piston-powered aircraft to prop-jet configurations to develop special purpose aircraft.

A commercial and instrument rated jet pilot who has flown a variety of experimental aircraft, Paulson's ronautical design for in-line, combination power aircraft resulted in his being granted five patents.

As President of American Jet—a company with \$35 million average annual sales—Paulson, in 1978, actived Grumman American Aviation Corporation. Reorganized as the Gulfstream Aerospace Corporation, sulson's firm currently produces the world's largest twin engine corporate jet, the Gulfstream III. The vannah facility also produces the 37 passenger Gulfstream I-C modified, propjet-powered commuter aircraft d provides major modification services for corporate owners and operators of earlier-model Gulfstream airaft, including the Gulfstream II-B.

In February 1981, Paulson's Gulfstream Aerospace Corporation acquired the Commander Jetprop business craft manufacturing facilities in Oklahoma from the Rockwell International Corporation. Operating as the immander Division of Gulfstream Aerospace Corporation, the division currently produces three models of in engine, propjet powered aircraft. The Commanders are marketed through a worldwide network of franised Regional and District Sales Centers. New jetprop models are being developed for addition, on an annual sis, to the commander Division's line of business aircraft.

In April 1982, Paulson's firm was rated as the world's largest privately owned aircraft manufacturing comny. The same month, Gulfstream Aerospace Corporation received its first listing on the New York Stock change.

Paulson's aviation industry-related activities include his active membership in the Society of Experimental st Pilots and the U.S. Air Force Association. Elected to the Board of Directors of the General Aviation Manufacers Association, Paulson currently serves as Chairman of the Association's Airport/Airways Committee.

Paulson is a member of the Board of Trust Company Bank of Georgia, the Savannah Symphony Society, Society of Automotive Engineers and the National Aeronautic Association. He holds memberships in the vannah Chatham Club in Savannah, Georgia, the Sea Pines Plantation, Hilton Head Island, South Carolina, d the Quail Creek Country Club in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

SOUTHERN BOOSTERS

Southern Boosters, Inc. is the backbone of Georgia Southern Athletics. Funds raised by Southern

oosters are used for athletic scholarships and recruiting.

Membership in Southern Boosters has grown to 1,300 members in its short four year existence. While the bulk of the members reside in the Statesboro area, Southern Boosters has large and active hapters in Augusta, Atlanta, Macon, and numerous cities throughout the state. Southern Boosters as developed one of the most successful Courtesy Car programs in Division 1-AA. In addition 5 money raised for scholarships and recruiting, over \$4 million has been raised through Southern boosters for the construction of Paulson Stadium.

Priority seating and parking for football and basketball are determined by an individual's anual donation to Southern Boosters. Donation levels run from the basic "Booster" (\$50 minimum) "Gold Eagle" status (\$5,000 and above). Booster members enjoy many privileges, such as priority eating, special parking for home games, periodic newletters, pre-and post-game socials, weekly incheons with the coaching staff, and use of the new facilities building at the stadium.

THIS IS GEORGIA SOUTHERN

Georgia Southern College is the thirdinking residential institution in the University ystem of Georgia and the leading college in the outhern half of the state, with a student body ver 7,000 strong and still growing as the colige approaches its 81st year.

Southern's 457 acre campus in the county eat of Statesboro is set in a rolling landscape mong towering pines and majestic oaks, its orizon blending the grace of traditional outhern architecture with the sleekness of its todern complex, including a 69-seat lanetarium, a modern educational center, a new brary with shelves holding more than a quarter f a million volumes, a fine arts recital hall and allery, and indoor and outdoor athletic arenas.

The Georgia Southern student may choose om 35 degree program concentrations, ranging from two-year to six-year levels. Eighteen ndergraduate degrees are offered in 63 major elds of study, while graduate students may purie an education specialist degree in 18 major reas or choose from eight masters degree programs. The college is accredited by the Southern association of Colleges and Schools, with everal of its divisions earning special individual accreditation from professional and academic sociations which set the educational standards their fields.

Georgia Southern combines the advantages f a "small college" atmosphere of friendliness ad individuality with most of the assets offered "big college" campuses. The college's 80 stuent organizations include special interest clubs, rofessional fraternities and sororities, student overnment and activities offices, and honor ocieties. Georgia Southern draws its richly tixed and diverse student body from all over the state and many parts of the nation and the orld, each adding to and sharing in the college sperience.

Talented students will find creative company other young people who devote their leisure me to athletics, the concert band, philharmonic noir, drama and student publications.

Students also enjoy opportunities to hear peakers of national reknown, to take in travelig exhibits and to attend outstanding cultural performances which make Georgia Southern a stop on their national and international tours.

The institution was established in 1906 by a special legislative act as one of ten district agricultural and mechanical schools. To secure the location of the first district school, the people of Statesboro and Bulloch County gave 300 acres of land, installed and furnished lights free for 10 years and contributed \$25,000 cash.



The school opened its doors February 7, 1908, serving on an elementary and secondary level and maintaining a special course for teachers. In August 1924, the first district school's role changed. The post World War I need for teachers moved the legislature to convert the institution to the Georgia Normal School. In four years' time it expanded to a four year institution, awarding its first B.S. degrees in June 1929. The same summer the name was again changed to Georgia Teachers College to reflect a state wide influence.

By the late 1950's the college had begun to offer a wide range of degrees beyond education, and a Master's degree program was added. This change in structure led to yet another name change, to the current Georgia Southern College. Throughout these changes, Southern never lost its close ties with Statesboro and the two communities grew steadily together. When the doors first opened in 1908, the institution had just 46 students and there were fewer than 2,000 people in Statesboro. Today with 7,000 students, the community has grown to 20,000.
